Goal

To revive the viable population of vulture in the wild

Objectives

To prevent the extinction of vulture species by ensuring re-introduction, safe food supply, maintenance of suitable habitat and better understanding of the ecological importance of these birds in Nepal.

Outputs

- 1. Complete ban on Diclofenac and other non-tested NSAIDs secured and alternative safe NSAIDs (including Meloxicam) promoted,
- 2. Level of vulture conservation awareness among general public increased,
- 3. Breeding population of vultures in the wild increased,
- 4. Captive bred population of vultures reintroduced,
- 5. Science based information system established
- 6. Partnership among national and international organizations fostered,

Activities

Over 42 program activities were identified in the plan.
